I have just started to rebuild a very early XK engine, and I love it. A chap has been restoring an XK140 for years and is now ready for an engine. He asked me if I could find him one for his XK and I just happened to have one in the shed, it was lying there in all its dirty glory, waiting for him to call, probably for 30 odd years.

I love the early engines, in my opinion they never really improved much from the original concept. Sure, they over-bored the heck out of them, raised the compression, doubled the valve size, tripled the valve overlap, the lead and the lag. They doubled the BHP and made them faster and higher revving, but that only goes to prove what a fabulous engine the original concept was. The Vines to Sea Tour 49th Jaguar National Rally South Australia

April, 2018

It's been 10 years since the JDCSA have hosted a National Rally and Des and I looked forward to the experience of again travelling to Adelaide for this event. We boarded the Spirit of Tasmania on Tuesday 10th April along with fellow Club members Martin & Kaye Wilson, Carol & Glen Clements and Dan Kukolj. Along with the Wilson's, we had pre-booked accommodation at Tailem Bend which turned out to be a good move as others were unable to obtain a bed until arriving at Murray Bridge.

Arriving in Tanunda on Thursday 12th we found our Stayz house which we were sharing with Wandy & Geoff and Martin & Kaye. We had chosen Stayz houses in Tanunda and Victor Harbor as all Rally accommodation had been taken. In the end it turned out a good choice, as we were only a stones throw away from Headquarters in Tanunda and just across the golf course, within easy walking in McCracken, Victor Harbour.

What is the history of this JCCT Plaque??

Recently, the club received an enquiry via the club website to inform the Jaguar Daimler Heritage Trust of the history of a plaque found within their collection. Here's the original enquiry:

I am currently updating the documentation of Artefacts in the possession of the Jaguar Heritage Trust at the British Motor Museum, Gaydon, UK.

Within our collection is a pine wood plaque displaying your (former) Club logo in an acrylic domed badge, set on an outline of Tasmania. Our interest is much piqued and I would be grateful for any information you may be able to provide concerning its history and production.

Principally we would be like to ascertain the following:

- 1. Date of production, reason for production and numbers produced
- 2. Type of wood utilised

3. Details of the history and design of your (former) logo featuring the "Tasmanian Leaper"

I have attached an image of the plaque and do hope a member of your club has some recollection of this splendid piece of artwork!

What a challenge!! Being well beyond my "knowledge bank" of the club, the word went out to the committee to assist with learning more about this plaque.

The club has had several logos over the years and this was quickly deemed to be a car grill badge of an earlier logo. Hence, several long-standing club members were approached to "test the grey matter" and offer some guidance on the plaque such that a considered response could be provided to Peter. As part of this process, it was important to establish how such a unique plaque may have made its way to the Jaguar Daimler Heritage Trust collection. From the logo, it was soon established to be pre-1994. Designed by Graeme Foster and produced from c.1979, these clear enamelled badges were used for fixing to car grilles and as class trophies at state rallies. Hence, based on this information, it was thought perhaps it may have been part of a National Rally in Tasmania, possibly c.1987? However, there was no obviously marking as such and it doesn't explain how it could have made its way to JDHT.

'Lofty' England was known to have visited Tasmania in c.1986/87, along with several other high-profile people within Jaguar circles. Was it perhaps presented to Lofty?

After several other enquiries within the club, we were able to respond to Peter with the below response:

Hi Peter,

After some wonderful input by several long-serving members within the Jaguar Car Club of Tasmania, we have the following information to assist you in your research.

The plaque is made from Huon Pine, a timber unique to Tasmania and now in very short supply.

The badge on the plaque was our car grill badge at the time.

It was designed by Graeme Foster, who was President of JCCT in the 1980's and is sadly no longer with us now. Graeme was a Graphic Designer.

To assist, I have attached the 2013 October edition of our monthly Jaguar Torque magazine, which has an article on the history of the club's badges (p.22). The grill badge in question was produced in c.1979 as the club badge. Quantity unknown, but expected to be close to 100.

The general consensus is that the plaque was a special presentation to Lofty England during his visit in c.1986/1987.

Exact date unknown, though it's been suggested that Les Hughes (Jaguar Magazine – Australia) may know these details.

You may wish to contact Les to "tighten-down" the dates of Lofty's visit to Australia/Tasmania?

Hope that helps.

The battery on Jaguar's Tesla challenger charges in 45 minutes

Jaguar's been teasing its upcoming Tesla rival, the I-Pace since late 2016. Jaguar has announced its first electric vehicle will come with quick charging.

The company has claimed the I-Pace will be able to charge its battery from zero per cent to 80 per cent within 45 minutes. There is a catch, though. To be able to charge the vehicle at this rapid rate, owners will need to plug-in to a 100kW DC charger.

At present, chargers in the UK won't support this potential speed. Jaguar has previously claimed the I-Pace's battery will charge to around 80-90 per cent on the more common 50kW charger in 90 minutes. This is still pretty nifty but as more high-speed charging points become available owners will undoubtedly make the transition across.

While the 100kW charging infrastructure isn't widespread at present, there are efforts to increase the capability of fast chargers. An 'ultra fast' system with charge rates of up to 350kW was installed in Germany in December 2017. When Nissan announced its new 2019 electric Leaf at the beginning of this year it also included 100kW fast charging.

The I-Pace itself is a four-door, five-seater electric performance SUV and it's predicted the battery will have a range of around 500km (310 miles) from a single charge. This puts it in direct competition with Tesla's Model X. Jaguar says the I-Pace will also be able to be "prepared" for a journey at its owner's house by plugging it into the mains.

The I-Pace was first revealed at the LA Auto Show back in December of 2016. At the time the car was only a concept but the company's previous conversion of the F-Pace from a design project to production vehicle showed it's serious about turning its ideas into new roadworthy vehicles.

When revealing the concept vehicle, Jaguar said it will have electric motors at the front and rear axles. Each motor will produce the equivalent of 197bhp. It's claimed the car will have a 0-60mph time of four seconds.
